TREATY WITH CUBA

The Bill Making It Effective Will Be Taken Up in the House Monday.

WILL TAKE A VOTE ON IT THURSDAY

Senator Morgan Is Prepared For a Prolonged Discussion of the Panama Situation in the Senate.

The general opposition to that he will offer his speeches until the new canal treaty shall be sent to the Senate.

Washington, Nov. 15.—The bill making effective the Cuban reciprocity convention reported by the war and means committee will be taken up in the House Monday and discussed on Thursday. It probably will be sent to the Senate Friday, Mr. Payne (R., Va.), chairman of the ways and means committee, in accordance with the notice he gave when he reported the bill on Friday.

A vote will be taken on the bill on Monday. A vote will be taken by the committee on rules providing for the intervening action. On the adoption of the rule the House will appoint a committee of the whole and discussion of the Cuban bill will be begun.

The program of the minority is to file a roll calling of amendments until the bill is either passed or defeated by the committee on rules. The result may be a vote on the bill on Monday, Tuesday or Friday, with the following adjournment will be taken on Thursday or Friday until the following Monday. The work of introducing bills and presenting petitions will go forward, but with the exception of the cases bill neither bills nor petitions will be taken up in committee nor discussed in the Senate during the week. It is felt by some members that Senator Morgan is prepared for a prolonged discussion of the situation on the treaty of Panama, but while he seems not to have taken any one into his confidence the general opposition is that he will offer his speeches until the new canal treaty shall be sent to the Senate. There is an understanding on the part of senators that even though the negotiations of the new convention be forthwith completed, it will not be transmitted to the Senate until the beginning of the regular session of Congress in December. It is expected that the Cuban bill will be reported from the House on Friday and it is probable that a session will be held on that day in order that the bill may be referred to the committee on foreign relations, which will begin its consideration at once.

SAINT DOMINGO ATTACKED.

The Forts Around the City Were Engaged With the Insurgents.

Saint Domingo, Thursday, Nov. 12.—There was heavy fighting here this morning. The forts around the city were engaged with the insurgents and there was considerable cannonading on both sides. The forts were not damaged and the situation is unchanged. The United States cruiser battleships arrived this afternoon. Business is at a standstill.

FETER IN DENMARK.

President Roosevelt Sends his Best Wishes to King Christian.

Copenhagen, Nov. 15.—Feter was held throughout Denmark Sunday in honor of the 60th anniversary of King Christian's accession to the throne, the population everywhere rendering homage to their aged and beloved sovereign. King Christian, who is in excellent health, desired to spend the day quietly with his family at Frederiksberg castle, but according to this desire, an enormous crowd went to the castle and cheered him and he was compelled several times to return to the throne.

Thousands of telegrams and addresses of congratulation as well as gifts and flowers have been sent him by the monarchs of all countries. His Majesty's answer to the telegrams came from the United States. The United States minister here, Washington, United States minister Sweden, telegraphed to the king President Roosevelt's hearty congratulations coupled with the best wishes for his majesty's health and for a continuation for many years to come of his peaceful, happy and prosperous reign.

DIED IN A BATHROOM.

Chevalier Petich, Scientist, Inventor and Scholar, Passes Away.

New York, Nov. 15.—In the bathroom of his home at Ninth avenue and Second Sunday the body of Chevalier Luigi Petich, former ambassador of Italy to Mexico, died. He had been dead three days and yesterday it was said to have been the cause of death. Petich, who was 62 years old, was a man of many attainments, a scientist, inventor and scholar, but without a real name. Luigi Petich was the man who found and secured the famous "Smiling Golem" heads. These were among the earliest of the famous "Smiling Golem" heads which went to prove the relationship of the latter race of the continent with Ahabite. The heads were found in Mexico in sepulchral mounds in which skeletons and broken relics were also discovered. Specimens of them have been made and sent all over the world.

The Petich collection, as it is called, consists of 1,200 objects, all of Mexican relics, and is of scientific value. It was secreted only to that in the museum of the city of Mexico.

INURED IN A RUNAWAY.

BOGOTA IS PANICKY

A Revolt in Colombia Is Feared According to Minister Bonaparte's Opinion.

AT LIBERTY TO LEAVE THE CAPITOL

Gen. Reyes, Bolivar and O'Connell Left Last Tuesday For Panama on a Diplomatic Mission.

Minister Bonaparte Continues His Efforts to Secure Recognition of the New Government by the European Nations.

Bogota, Tuesday, Nov. 10.—General Reyes, Bolivar and O'Connell left here today for Panama on a diplomatic mission with full powers to offer the signature of a satisfactory treaty and such other concessions as may bring the letters back to the Colombian capital.

It is expected that amicable arrangements will be made and such an amicable solution of the crisis at the state department at Washington is anxiously awaited.

STONED THE CARS.

Violent Demonstrations Resulted From Attempts to Run Them With Non-Union Men.

MANY HAND TO HAND CONFLICTS.

Several Patrol Wagons Which Had Previously Been Called Were Soon Filled With Prisoners.

Chicago, Nov. 15.—A victory, temporary at least, was scored Sunday by the management of the Chicago City railway against the striking employes. From early in the morning until dark the company succeeded in maintaining a regular service on its Western branch, which extends from 77th street to the downtown district, a distance of eight miles. The first car, manned by a non-union crew and followed four minutes later by another crew, left the car barn guarded by a force of policemen at 77th street and followed four minutes later by another crew, but clashed between the strike men and non-strikers on its way. It was frequently interfered with by delays and frequent obstructions, some placed on the tracks and the impermissibility of men in charge of cars. The most serious trouble occurred during the morning, when a crowd of strikers arrested several, but clashed between the police and non-strikers on its way. 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
